

Friends of OSD

2014

Friends of OSD (FOSD) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit formed by a small group of committed individuals in November 2006 to assist the Oregon School for the Deaf (OSD). We believe the School has a vital part to play in the education of deaf and hard of hearing children in Oregon. Our mission is to support this unique school and the children it nurtures by soliciting and distributing funds to enhance the School's programs and projects.

FOSD was created not to replace or supplant the responsibilities of the State of Oregon which has administrative responsibility for the School. Rather, FOSD operates as an independent nonprofit to assist OSD by *enhancing* the educational experience for students beyond the basic level of State funding, helping an already strong program reach even higher goals.



A center of deaf culture for more than 140 years, OSD registered over 120 students with hearing impairments for the 2014-15 school year (kindergarten through age 21). Students come from 43 different school districts across the state. About 60% are residential students who live in dormitories during the week. Students are provided the same subjects and diploma options as those offered in Oregon's public schools.

The Friends of OSD Board identified four initiatives as the focus of their efforts. We recently revised the brief explanations to better define each initiative:

- Education Projects that enhance the education of students who are deaf or hard-of-hearing
 and their families: participation in the Academic Bowl and Space Camp; driver permit tutoring;
 and the Family Learning Program.
- Cultural Activities Projects that relate to deaf culture and/or the arts: American Sign
 Language classes; artist-in-residence; and special speakers who are deaf, such as those who
 participate in the Middle School LIFE program.
- Innovative Programs Projects that incorporate new learning methods or experiences: participating in robotics competitions and micro-lending experiences; new skills programs/equipment for special needs students; and a school-wide positive behavior reinforcement program.
- Capital Improvements Minor projects that upgrade portions of dated facilities and which are
 not mandated State responsibilities: assisting in the installation of a lift for the swimming pool;
 professional-quality equipment and remodeling for the Career Technical Education approved TV
 broadcast studio.

In an effort to utilize board meeting time more efficiently, several work groups have been established: **Fundraising, Grants** and **Public Outreach**

Board members voluntarily join groups that most closely match their areas of interest and expertise, and each group provides regular reports at board meetings. These work groups are expanded as needed by enlisting the help of others from the community.

While the Board of Directors has legal responsibility to make policy decisions that guide the work of FOSD, the mission of the Advisory Council is to:

- lend their names to endorse the work of FOSD;
- lend their expertise to advise FOSD when needed;
- participate in projects, events and activities according to their interests and abilities; and,
- meet once a year to consider FOSD's annual report and to respond with relevant comments, advice, guidance and suggestions for the good of the organization.

Advisors have neither the same authority nor the same legal responsibilities as the Board of Directors and can neither control nor compel the Board to act. They are considered as ambassadors of FOSD and are valued for their advisory role and support of the organization.

The First Annual Joint Meeting of the Advisory Council and Board of Directors of FOSD was held Thursday, April 17, 2014 at the School.



The OSD Middle School Choir opened the meeting by singing and signing *The Star Spangled Banner*. OSD Director, Sharla Jones, provided a brief introduction to programs and services available to students as well as an update of recent happenings affecting the School. Board members shared information about FOSD financial resources and fundraising activities and gave examples of how proceeds have been used to support OSD. At the request of the Board President, Advisory Council members suggested names of individuals who might be interested in serving on the FOSD Board of Directors. They also provided ideas for increasing community awareness and support for FOSD. We are grateful for their involvement and input.

Enhancing the Educational Experience of OSD Students

Educational Enhancement Awards

The Educational Enhancement Awards (EEA) Program provides funds for projects and activities that are outside the budget responsibility and/or capability of the School.

FOSD was able to continue making Educational Enhancement Awards during 2014

Open to all OSD staff, instructions and application forms can be accessed from the FOSD website. There now are three types of EEA applications:

- "Expedited Awards" of \$500 or less.
- "Board Review Awards" of \$501-\$1,500, which require a more detailed proposal narrative with emphasis on the purpose, goal, benefit and evaluation component.
- "Special Projects" for projects or activities that exceed \$1,500.

Board members individually reviewed and scored all applications against established criteria and approved the following proposals during 2014:

• Purchase of equipment and supplies to enhance the Deaf Panther Productions studio






Due to the availability of special private funding earmarked to support *Deaf Panther Productions* ("Panther" is the School's mascot), FOSD purchased studio remodeling materials, professional-level television cameras, lighting, monitors and other equipment and accessories that will allow students to experience and learn from OSD's enhanced professional-level broadcast studio.

Panther TV is an enrichment offering for high school students. They plan, produce, direct and broadcast news events and happenings of all age levels and interests at the School. Guided by OSD staff, students use professional equipment to film short videos, edit them, plan a broadcast, write a script and do a live weekly broadcast to the OSD audience. Then they post the finished product on the OSD website. Panther TV broadcasts provide families and friends the opportunity to keep in touch with activities and events at the School and encourage communication. These broadcasts have become cultural events, not only for students and their families, but also for the greater community—both deaf and hearing.

• Purchase of digital single-lens reflex (DSLR) camera for Yearbook Program

FOSD purchased a Nikon D3100 Cameral Kit, including 5 lenses, memory card, bag, flash, lens cleaning kit, reader, strap and tripod, to be used by the OSD Yearbook Program. This Program allows students to photograph and document each year in their educational history. Combining art, literacy and history, the Yearbook Program instills lifelong learning by exploring student potential in photography, digital design and journalism career fields; or, simply the joy of creating memories in their lives as an amateur photographer.

The camera was put to use immediately. Because most Seniors could not afford the traditional senior pictures this year, Yearbook students stepped up and provided high quality individual photos to Seniors without cost.

• Purchase of occupational therapy equipment



Responding to a request from OSD's Occupational Therapist, FOSD purchased a suspension system and other adaptive equipment designed to help about 10% of the OSD student body who interpret sensory information in unique ways that result in challenges which interfere with learning. Use of this equipment has been found to improve their behavior, focus and attention for greater academic success.

• Purchase of greenhouse for the Garden Program



FOSD paid for the construction of a new greenhouse for the School Garden Program which provides a crosscurricular education experience in reading, writing, math, science, history and art. In addition, the Garden Program promotes the environmental, social and physical wellbeing of the School community and fosters a better understanding of how the natural world sustains us.

A "spin-off" Helping Hands Program raised nearly \$1,200 in matching funds for greenhouse construction. Based on a business model, this program provided fresh produce for use in the School cafeteria and to sell at local farmers' markets and to School employees. Students develop skills in the areas of business, food production, nurseries and nutrition as possible future careers.

Our friends and families benefit from the beautiful blooms and tasty produce, and FOSD raised about \$400 to support programs and activities at OSD.




VINE GOGH

For the second year Boon's hosted a fall "Family and Friends Night" with a portion of the profits going to FOSD to support projects such as the Family Learning Program, Educational Enhancement Awards, and other innovative programs at OSD.



From 5:00 p.m. to closing, nearly every table was full as families and friends gathered to support FOSD, partake of menu items and just enjoy time together. Boon's management presented FOSD with a check for more than \$1,300 and invited us to come again in 2015--and we already have made plans to do so!

CAMPERSHIPS



In 2014 an anonymous donor generously contributed a sum of money to Friends of OSD for the purpose of providing a summer educational and respite opportunity for OSD students. With input from the donor, it was agreed that Camp Taloali would be an ideal location. The FOSD Board developed an application process; and, in conjunction with OSD, a selection committee was established.

Camp Taloali is located in the foothills of Oregon's Cascade Mountains about 20 miles east of Salem. The Camp borders the North Santiam River and encompasses 111 acres of beautiful pine and fir forestland.

Programs are specifically designed for Deaf, Hard of Hearing, Children of Deaf Adults, siblings and signing friends. Activities provide campers with a variety of challenges and achievements: soccer, softball, Frisbee, volleyball, basketball and archery. Also included are arts and crafts, theater and communication, camping and outdoor skills, horseback riding, nature study, rope courses, environmental awareness, campfires and totem pole building.

TECH TALK

FOSD launched its first website in 2009, designed by a West Salem High School student and maintained by Board members. After 5 years, it was apparent that improvements could be made to update and enhance our presence on the Web, and in 2014 the Board approved funds from the Operations budget to be used for that purpose.

Eight website development vendors were identified; four submitted proposals; and three made personal presentations to the Board. A Salem firm, Joshua Lindley Consulting, was selected.

Board members provided input to ensure the re-designed site will be welcoming, accessible and user-friendly. A launch date for the new site is set for April, 2015.



In addition to our website re-design, Board President, Roshani Shay, developed a Facebook page for FOSD, and we have 232 "likes". This has proven to be a quick and fairly easy way to post activities and events as well as photos, announcements and other information for our followers.






FRIENDS OF OSD FEATURED

The *Statesman Journal*, Salem's daily newspaper, regularly publishes information about local nonprofits. In June, 2014, Friends of OSD was featured in the "Causes" section as an organization that makes a difference in the community. Besides giving an opportunity to provide basic information about FOSD, our Board President was invited to include a message to readers, which she did as follows:

"Oregon School for the Deaf has changed the lives of many deaf and hearing-impaired children from all over Oregon. It takes more than the basics to help OSD's students become successful and contributing members of the community. Friends of OSD was established to raise awareness of OSD's special needs and to help fund innovative projects such as: a Family Learning Program; a CTE-certified TV studio; student participation in the Academic Bowl; a Life Skills curriculum; a Middle School Leadership Conference. It is our hope that the Salem community in particular will step up to support this amazing school, its staff and students."

For the second year, the *Statesman Journal* solicited "wish lists" from local nonprofits. On Thanksgiving Day, November 27, 2014, while many of us were enjoying a delicious holiday meal in a warm house, surrounded by family and friends, many others in need rely on nonprofits for assistance. The *Statesman* compiled and published a *Catalog of Giving* to ask the community to help meet those needs through donations.






Funding to assist the

Oregon School for the Deaf

The sole purpose of Friends of OSD is to assist the Oregon School for the Deaf. FOSD started the year with \$28,320.89 in the bank and ended with a balance of \$35,052.59.

95% of all grants and donations go directly to programs that benefit students. A modest 5% administrative assessment covers the expenses of doing business as a nonprofit (office supplies, postage, annual fees, interpreters, insurance, etc.).

Although our efforts to obtain grants from foundations were not successful during 2014, through new, innovative fundraising efforts, we were able to broaden our donor base of individual, community organization and business-corporate giving.
